

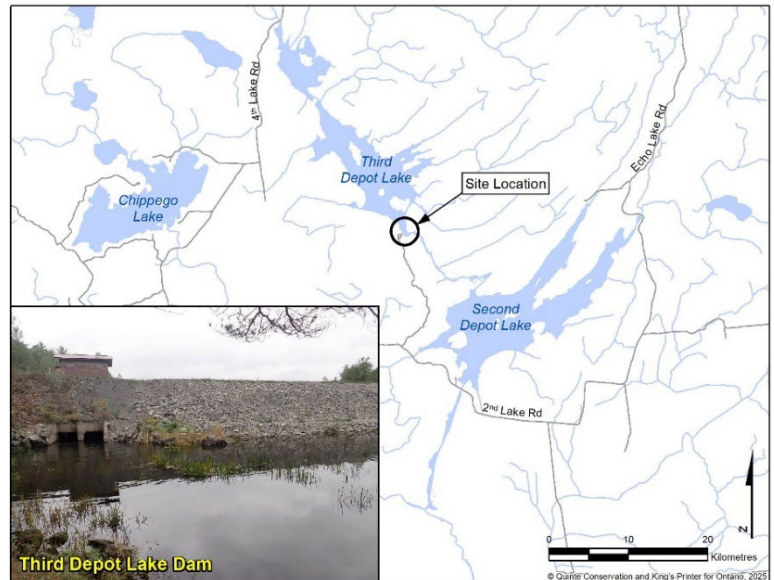
The Quinte Conservation Authority (QCA) has commenced a study regarding Third Depot Lake Dam located at the outlet of Third Depot Lake into Depot Creek in Lot 7 Conc. 8 Hinchinbrooke Township, Frontenac County. The dam was constructed in multiple stages in the mid to late 1970's and is reaching the end of its useful lifespan. The deteriorating condition of the dam necessitates that a decision be made on whether to decommission, rehabilitate, or replace the existing dam within the next 5 years.

The study team invites you to participate in the study, which is being completed in accordance with the Conservation Ontario's Class Environmental Assessment for Remedial Flood and Erosion Control Projects. The Class EA process includes public, government agencies, federal and provincial ministries, stakeholders and Indigenous Communities consultation, characterization of the study area and the identification and evaluation of alternatives using sound criteria to select the technically preferred alternative. This study will investigate the potential environmental, social, and economic impacts of the preferred alternative and identify measures to mitigate any adverse impacts.
